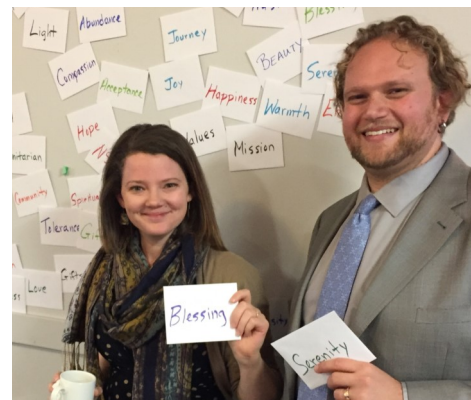

Audio Visual System Update

We made it! NSUC will soon join the club of ‘technologically advanced churches’ with an audiovisual system in the sanctuary.

This project was kicked off by a generous anonymous donation of \$7500 towards the \$15,000 cost of a new projector and screen. The congregation was to make up the difference. Elain Duvall came up with a brilliant scheme to raise the money, and Barrie Forbes led the campaign in March. Everyone was encouraged to select an envelope with a hidden number (from 1 to 122) on the inside flap indicating the amount they were asked to contribute. The element of surprise made selection exciting! If we’d sold them all, we’d have raised \$7500.

As it turns out, over 100 people participated (many giving more than their ‘numbers’) and we raised over \$9300. The equipment installation is ongoing and scheduled to complete by mid June. This will go a long way to enhance our Sunday services, various FundFest events, and other presentations. Thank you so much for all your support!

The first week after moving into our new home—with half emptied boxes in every room, a list of organizational projects a mile long, and all our rhythms and routines disrupted—we woke up to find one of our car windows smashed. The would-be thief, who must have been eyeing the oh-so-lucrative diaper bag we left in the car, didn't even make it into the car as most of the glass was still in place, just shattered. Tears, shouting, and hair pulling ensued.

And that very day we find ourselves planning for the month ahead at church on the theme of Celebration.

We bowed to the holy Trickster and remembered the paradox that when we are least able to celebrate is often when we need to do so the most. So we celebrate. And when you don't really feel like celebrating but you are trying to anyway, it's good to start small. The kindness of the bank teller who found a better solution for getting money across the border. The extra cilantro piled onto the Vietnamese sandwich. And as that pathway back to gratitude begins to clear, even the challenges become sources of celebration: having a home is worth celebrating, no matter how disarranged. Having a car is worth celebrating, even if it's got a broken window.

As this church year comes to an end, we have been hearing a lot of celebration around here, and it's not even the reluctant, begrudging, need-to-get-yourself-back-on-track celebrating that we were doing that day. This community is celebrating a busy year of connections and accomplishments, big and small. At our services this month we will recognize and lift up the many people who have made it so.

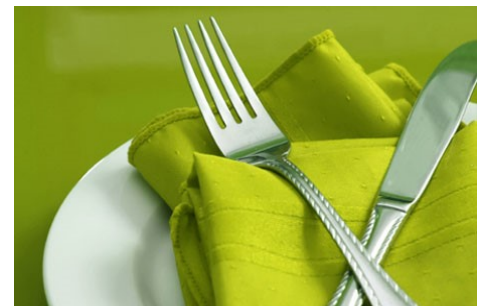

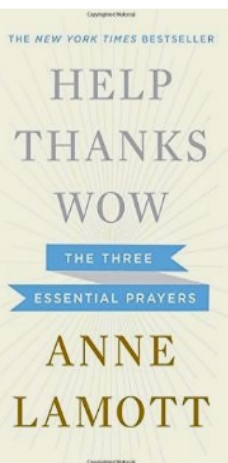
Cronies

How to Pay by e-Transfer

Here's how to pay for your FundFest purchases using eTransfer!

1. Using your online banking, set up NSUC as an "Interac e-Transfer" Recipient. Use the church's main email address: info@northshoreunitarians.ca.
2. Set up the e-Transfer amount and date. In the "To" box, select NSUC from your list of Payees. Choose a one-time payment or schedule smaller payments spread over several months.
3. When prompted, set up a Security Question and Answer. Your question can be "What is my password?" For the Answer, use the letters "nsuc" (all lowercase) followed by the last 4 digits of your phone number as published in our Church Directory. For example, if your phone number is 604-123-4567 then your Security Answer will be: **nsuc4567**. If you're not listed in the Church Directory, use "nsuc" with no numbers.

4. In the message box, indicate what the payment is for ("FundFest 2017" for example, or "Pledge").

5. Confirm the e-Transfer.

Janni will email you a confirmation to let you know that it worked properly.

Our little ones in the **Spirit Play** program learned about Passover Seder, How a Seed Becomes a Plant, the pagan celebration of Beltane in a story called "The May Queen" and heard a story perfect for Mothers' Day called "Love You Forever." It is magical watching the children interact with these stories and respond to the ritual songs and chalice lighting that open each Sunday session.



7-8 Year Olds

The children in the **UU Super Heroes** program heard the stories of:

- **Clara Barton**, who overcame her shyness to start the American Red Cross, having learned about it in Switzerland.
- **Malvina Reynolds**, social activist and singer/songwriter who wrote *Magic Penny*.
- **Beatrix Potter** illustrator/writer of the *Peter Rabbit* book series and an eco-supporter of the National Trust in England.
- **Olympia Brown**, the first woman to be ordained by a denomination and who had an important role in the quest for women's suffrage.



9-10 Year Olds

Children in the **Sing to the Power** program are exploring various forms of power to be used for the common good.

The power of action: the children heard about Bill McKibben and the organization he founded, 350.org, to fight climate change. They made their own solar ovens out of pizza boxes.

The power of reaching out: They learned about UUA's Standing on the Side of Love and played games that explored what it means for a message to "go viral" and what it feels like to exclude or include people.

The power of water: they learned how the Colorado River carved out the Grand Canyon. They played games that involved the water power characteristics of flexibility and creativity, and worked to resolve scenarios in which two groups wanted opposing results.

The power of persistence: they carved soap as an experience of slow, careful persistence.

INQUIRING souls

11-12 Year Olds

Our 11-12 year old **Inquiring Souls** attended the Coming of Age service on April 23 in anticipation of those who are now in Grade 7 graduating this June and entering this youth program next year. They spent some time in a subsequent class talking about different coming of age/quest rituals in other faith and cultural traditions. Talking about the origins of Mothers' Peace Day led to a larger discussion about (mis)appropriation. They made the link to the fact that not only Hallmark capitalizes on major religious and cultural holidays and celebrations, so do chocolate companies. Easter, Christmas, Valentine's Day and others have fallen victim to appropriation. You never quite know where a question will take you.

Our contractor's team is planning to complete the screen installation and connections by the end of the month.

Final invoices received for snow removal bring their total to just under the expected \$3,000.

Please thank Barrie Forbes and Roy Brand for the maintenance tasks they accomplished in May: dealing with blow down timber, installing door stops, and replacing plants at the entrance. 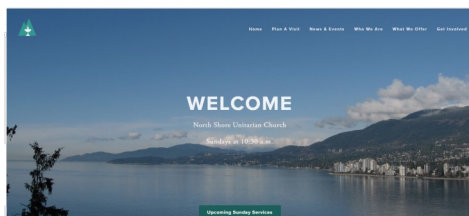
